


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

CSPWC PARTICIPATES IN 9TH WATERCOLOUR BIENNIAL

The CSPWC has been invited to participate in the 9th International Mexico Biennial at the Museo Nacional de la Acuarela, in Coyoacán, México. Since the inauguration of World Watercolour Day the biennial has been timed to be a part of those celebrations. World Watercolour Day is on November 23rd and the exhibition will run from December 2010 to February 2011 and include works from over twenty countries.

The Biennial was established by the late Maestro Alfredo Guati Rojo in 1994. The CSPWC/SCPA was first invited to participate in 1996. Since then six artists have been selected to represent the CSPWC/SCPA at each biennial. Fifty CSPWC members have participated in these exhibitions from 1996 to 2010.



For the 2010/11 exhibition CSPWC/SCPA has chosen six members to represent the Society: Peter Marsh, President, Katherine Zarull, First Vice President, Norma Bradley-Walker, Quebec Regional Director, Ellen Catherwood, Northern Ontario Regional Director, Leonard Gerbrandt, Eastern Ontario Regional Director, and Maurice Snelgrove, Director.

These artists were randomly selected from the CSPWC directors with no previous participation in the Biennial.

The arrangements for participation in the 2008 and 2010 Biennials have been made by Marilena Isacescu Carlea. Many thanks go to Alejandro Rabazo who helped us with the Spanish translation and handled the Spanish correspondence with the Museum.

COSTA RICA TO PAINT

In March 2010, I was an Artist-in-Residence at an art colony in Colon, Costa Rica. Several years ago a painting friend had been there and recommended the facility and location.

Costa Rica is a smallish, Central American country sandwiched between Panama and Nicaragua. Along the spine of mountains that run from north-west to south-east, are a string of active volcanoes. Colon is in the central valley and is a Spanish speaking, non-tourist town about an hour outside the capital, San Jose. The people are very friendly but don't speak much English. You can buy most of what you need in local stores, but need to take your art supplies with you.

It was so stimulating to spend a month painting in a totally different environment. What could be more different from the short days, cold fogs, snow and ice of March in Newfoundland! Compare this to the perpetual warmth, open sky and 12-hour tropical day. This took me back to my first 24 years growing up in tropical Zimbabwe. It felt so familiar – just like going back home.

Apart from a 3 day excursion to Monteverdi Cloud Forest and Arenal Volcano, I made two 1 day excursions, firstly to Irazu Volcano and Lankester Garden and secondly to Manuel Antonio Park and its beaches on the Pacific Coast.

Although I do work 'on location' at times, the inclement Atlantic climate has made me into a predominantly studio artist. It would have been wonderful to spend two weeks in the Cloud Forest or in Lankester Garden, but it would have been quite expensive. The shortness of time encouraged me to use my new Canon camera very liberally, and to work in my colony studio from images on my laptop -- something I have wanted to try for a while. At the end of the month I had a substantial body of work – 9 full sheet watercolours, 2 half sheets, some small studies of orchids painted on location and a series of eighth sheet, semi-

abstracted shadow paintings.

The *For Julia and David White Artist Colony* was set up by Bill White in memory of his two children who both committed suicide. The seven artist studios are self-contained. They are basic, but spacious and comfortable, and set in 12 acres of forest and garden with a swimming

pool. The other artists can be musicians, writers or painters. We did go out to communal dinners at a nearby restaurant (walking through the forest) but most of the time you cook your own food and socialize as much as you wish. At the end of the month we had an afternoon round of studio visits to see and hear some of what had been accomplished.

This was a great experience, so great that I have booked to go back next year! For more information please email me or look at their website www.forjuliaanddavid.org

ORGANIZING A "COME AND SEE" TO PROMOTE THE CSPWC

When I was elected to the post of the Atlantic Director, in my mind I felt that promotion of the Society was what I could do best. I immediately thought of a Come and See in Digby as our newest elected Member, **Poppy Balsler**, lives there, and I had gotten to know her at the Cape Breton Symposium the year before. After a phone call and a few e-mails

Poppy found a venue for the event at the newly repainted Curling Club. It was lovely: lots of room, freshly painted, plenty of chairs, air-conditioned (very welcome on a hot and humid day) and a kitchen for our use.

I put out an APB to members and **Ron Hazell** was willing to help with this.

I contacted **Lio Lo** in Shelburne County and she was so pleased at the opportunity to finally meet some other members. **Golumba Kim** of Halifax also agreed to participate – and so it was a go. **Joanne Hunt** made a wonderful poster for printing and passing on and contacted the 'associate' list and a few other places that would find this of interest. Everyone sent it to their contacts. I managed to get it in the paper and on a few of the other art sites as did Poppy in her area.

I did not do any pre-registration. Doing this was a spur of the moment decision, and I hoped I would get a surprise with the turn-out and did I ever!

By 12:45 they started to come through the door and many had travelled quite a distance to attend-which was very gratifying. 33 participants paying \$5 each covered expenses

Ron and I spoke about the society and he used his old slide projector to show slides of some of the current members' work (at least 5 year old work too) as none of us had the ability to use a CD or DVD of current work. Each of the five of us took either prints or some current work to show on tables. Poppy and Golumba set up their paints and did demonstrations of techniques while Ron, Lio,



and myself set up tables in different areas for the attendees to bring their two pieces of framed or unframed work for critique. I phrased it thus: "If you don't like what I say, go to Ron, if you don't like what he says, go to Lio" and they happily made the rounds.

Two signed up right away for associate membership, many took away the forms. All had a flyer for *Open Water* and were encouraged to enter. Participants put their nametags in a bowl and I drew names for three prizes. I took a new w/c brush as a prize, a DVD of the Cape Breton Symposium, and a CSPWC book that came to me as the Atlantic Regional Director.

News on the Arts

CARFAC PROPOSES ARTIST RESALE RIGHT

CARFAC is proposing an amendment to Canada's Copyright Act (Bill C-32) that would give artists 5% of resale prices over \$1000. Many countries worldwide already have this legislation. It is envisioned that this would be of enormous benefit to senior artists and aboriginal artists in particular. There are also concerns about the proposed exception for educational use in the bill. If passed this would allow educational institutions to copy an artist's work with no compensation.

BEAVERBROOK GALLERY GETS TO KEEP PAINTINGS

After a protracted and expensive legal battle, the Beaverbrook Gallery in Fredericton will retain ownership of 85 works it was awarded in a 2007 arbitration. Paintings include J.M.W. Turner's *Fountain of Indolence* and Lucian Freud's *Hotel Bedroom* that are together worth \$40 million. The British Beaverbrook Foundation had claimed ownership of the works in 2004 and planned to remove the works from the Canadian gallery and sell them. 48 works will be returned to the UK foundation. The Beaverbrook Gallery has plans to tour an exhibition of works from its collection.

HAVE BRITAIN'S ART SUPERSTARS DAMAGED ARTS FUNDING?

Do the huge fortunes made by art superstars like Damien Hirst or the increasing deference of museums to commerce, damage the support of the public for arts funding? Questions are beginning to be asked in England where deep cuts to public funding for the arts are under way. To quote *Guardian* critic, Jonathon Jones: "the art world has done a bloody good job convincing everyone that it sleeps with celebrities on beds of hundred pound notes." So is it any wonder people think the arts can fend for themselves?

GROWING FOCUS ON WORK BY WOMEN ARTISTS

The Sheldon Museum of Art at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, has followed the lead of the Pompidou in Paris and is devoting 85% of its gallery space to work by women. *Better Half, Better Twelfth* refers to the fact that the gallery owns 12 paintings by men to every one by a woman. Kudos go to gallery Director Jorge Daniel Veneciano for taking the initiative. A documentary film by Pamela T. Boll, *Who Does She Think She Is?*, explores the suspicion of women who make art by following the lives of five women carving out space for their voice through art.

ANCIENT CAVE PAINTINGS DISCOVERED IN JORDAN

Experts from the Courtauld Institute in London have finished removing 2000 years of soot and grime from cave paintings of exceptional artistic quality discovered in Petra. They are the most important surviving examples of Nabataean art and are likely to become a major tourist attraction.

BC ARTIST BEING SUED BY DEALER

BC Anishinabe artist, Rebecca Belmore, who represented Canada at the 2005 Venice Biennale, is being sued for over \$750,000 after she decided to leave the Pari Nadimi Gallery in Toronto and asked for return of her artwork and payment for works sold. The gallery responded by suing her for breach of contract and is demanding punitive damages and compensation for future lost revenue. In response Belmore publicly "quit as an artist" in a performance piece outside Vancouver Art Gallery that was posted on YouTube. This raises several questions about business practices and artist's rights, and whether an artist can ever stop making art.


