Terry Fenton was guest speaker at the salon lecture in the Great Room on Friday September11th: an event that attracted a sold-out audience of forty. Now living in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Terry was an early director of the Leighton Centre, and has many connections to the people and area. He and his wife Sheila had in fact resided on site for over a year and have fond memories of that time.

Terry spoke on the *History of English Watercolour in Western Canada* and illustrated his talk with a digital slide show. He started with the great English tradition of watercolour in the 1800's – focusing on the plein air style, and also used examples from the collection at the Leighton Centre.

Wine and cheese were served in the studio and entry hallway. Members of the Board of the Leighton Art Centre were in attendance.

Watercolour Demonstration

On Saturday September 12th, I gave a watercolour workshop in the Weaving Studio on the old School House property adjacent to the gallery. This event was also sold out and twenty participants gathered around as I demonstrated techniques used in my First Fruits series. I showed three half-sheet watercolours of the Italian Prune with the same colour scheme/light conditions. The first two were done to the pencil stage. For one

of these I completed the background in front of the class. The third was a half-completed painting on which I continued the process. Some in attendance had never painted a watercolour before, and several CSPWC members came out in support of the event to see how I worked. Jean Pederson commented that she had never seen any other painter set up or work in the way that I did. So all came away with some ideas.

BIG CHANGES AT THE ART GALLERY OF PEEL

Judy Daley at the Art Gallery of Peel recently informed the CSPWC that The Peel Heritage Complex has received an infrastructure stimulus grant to renovate and expand their facility.

This is great news for the complex, but will result in the gallery being closed throughout 2010 and part of 2011. CSPWC Members with paintings in the Diploma Collection should note that if they are planning to borrow their painting

for an exhibition in 2010/11, the painting must be retrieved from the gallery by the end of February 2010. Access to artworks during the construction period will not be possible.

When re-opened, the Art Gallery of Peel will have greatly increased exhibition, storage and programming space. Details about the expansion can be found at www. peelheritagecomplex.org or by contacting the gallery at (905) 791-4055.

SENIOR ARTISTS' RESEARCH PROJECT

A group of Canadian arts organizations representing actors, choreographers, composers, dancers, musicians, visual artists and writers, is looking for ways to support Canada's senior artists who are aged 65 and over. The Senior Artists' Research Project (SARP) has hired Hill Strategies to undertake research to assess the situation and needs of senior artists in Canada.

By better understanding senior artists' needs and interests in areas such as artistic activity, health care, housing, financial issues, community connections and social networks, arts organizations will be able to improve current services

or establish new ones designed to meet artists' needs and interests.

This fall, focus group sessions and town hall meetings will take place across the country. Additionally, a more indepth survey available in both English and French is being sent to artists across Canada.



JACK REID



The CSPWC was saddened to learn that Jack Reid passed away on August 24th. He was elected to membership in 1975 and became a Life Member in 1998.

President Peter Marsh said of him: Jack's work is admired by other watercolour painters for the brilliance of its colour, the clarity and smoothness of its washes, the strength of each composition, and the simplicity of its

renderings. His work is classically Canadian and instantly recognisable. There is no doubt that his works will live long in the annals of Canadian art history.

Jack was also widely known and dearly loved as a teacher and mentor. Brigitte Schrever writes:

At my very first workshop Jack came over to look at my oil paintings and said in his burly voice: "Girl you've got talent. Take one of my wc workshops and I'm gonna make a watercolourist out of you". When Klaus and I visited his home exhibition Jack invited me to "come along" to his first away workshop - two weeks in San Miguel de Allende, but I knew we couldn't afford it.

Christmas came and I was presented with a home-made Christmas card that said "We wish you a Merry Christmas and a beautiful trip to Mexico." Under the tree were numerous parcels of all sizes and dimensions. Klaus had asked Jack to get everything a beginner in watercolour would need.

It was the beginning of a beautiful friendship.

Jack could also be tough and generous. Linda Kemp writes:

Jack phoned me to tell me that he had seen some of my workshop promotional literature. "Linda, it's not good enough. Come over to my studio and I will show you what you need to do." Jack set aside a full day to work with me. He gave me the kick in the pants that I needed along with a most valuable gift - an address list that he had compiled of trusted workshop hosts and co-ordinators that I was to contact to help me in my journey as an instructor.

Jack generously gave wisdom, support and joy to others. He never guarded his knowledge, but delighted in passing it along.

And Brian Atyeo says:

I had a huge respect for Jack. He earned it with his never-ending search for a better way of thinking. At times, Jack's search offered up true insight and wisdom.

We often talked about things spiritual, and the effect it had on our art. One of my favourite quotes of Jack's addressed the concept of a God, an entity Jack had no fear of. To paraphrase: "There are many gateways that lead to God. The gateways themselves are not God."

News on the Arts

Using this method of communication saves the office a great deal of printing, postage and time, and the resources saved can be put towards serving you better.

REVISED COPYRIGHT LEGISLATION IS ON THE **HORIZON**

The government has been conducting national consultations prior to announcing new copyright legislation. Artists should make themselves aware of how any changes could affect their ability to retain and benefit from copyright in their work. The balance between users' rights and creator rights in a digital age can be tricky.

MORE BAD NEWS IN BC

The provincial government has withdrawn a large portion of the gaming grants that had been promised to artists and arts organizations. Added to the recent major reduction in provincial funding to the arts, artists in Canada's west are reeling. The cuts could amount to between 85 and 92% by 2012 and cause an exodus of creative talent.

VISUAL ARTS ONTARIO CHANGES ITS FOCUS

Responding to a fundamental shift in the way artists, businesses and markets operate, cooperate and communicate, Visual Arts Ontario is in the process of re-inventing its relationship with its members. The future of VAO will be an open, collaborative online hub for Ontario artists. New programmes and methods of communication will be announced in Spring 2010.

PLANNING A TRIP TO BRITAIN?

Tate Britain will stage a major Henry Moore exhibition opening in February 2010. In the autumn of 2010 Tate Modern will hold the first exhibition in fifty years devoted to the work of Paul Gaugin.

YEAR OF THE WOMAN AT THE POMPIDOU CENTRE

In May the Pompidou Centre in Paris opened a major year long exhibition of 500 works by more than 200 women artists from the 20th and 21st centuries. There will be periodic additions and rotations of paintings, sculptures, installations, drawings photographs etc.

PAINTINGS FOUND IN GOODWILLL BIN SELL FOR \$134,000

Helen Zhuang, a sharp eyed clerk at a Toronto good-will donation depot, spotted two paintings that she thought might have special value. They proved to be by Federico Del Campo, a renowned 19th century painter of European scenes, and sold at a Waddington auction for \$134,000. The money raised will go towards creating jobs in the community.

WILL GALLERY ANNOUNCEMENT CARDS SOON BE **RELICS?**

Many galleries are announcing the end of printed exhibition announcement cards. Will others follow? Is it environmental concern or cost cutting that is driving the trend?

CANADA NO LONGER HAS A PORTRAIT GALLERY

In early September an announcement was made that in future the Portrait Gallery of Canada will be a programme of the National Library and Archives. The gallery will lose its name and its Director General, Lilly Koltun. The possibility of a permanent portrait gallery would seem to be further diminished by this announcement although touring exhibitions from the collection will continue to be mounted.

MARLIS SAUNDERS (Sarnia, ON) recently had over 100 of her textile designs accepted into the permanent collection of The Design Exchange in Toronto. Most of the designs are painted on paper with tempera or gouache water based paints. Some are printed or woven into fabrics. Marlis trained at the Textile Engineering School in Krefeld, Germany known as the Silk and Textile City. She was accepted into a master class taught by Georg Muche who had been a teacher at the Bauhaus along with Kandinsky, Klee and Feininger. Marlis exhibited her designs at the Biennale in Milan and worked as a textile designer in Germany, Britain, Australia and Canada. Look for an exhibition of her work at The Design Exchange.
