Her Excellency The Right Honourable Michaëlle Jean, Governor General of Canada, and Patron of the CSPWC, invited our artists to witness a tree planting by Prince Charles, Honorary Member of the CSPWC, and the Duchess of Cornwall.

The evening before, Peter Marsh was also invited to attend an official state dinner at Rideau Hall in honour of the royal couple. (See stories on pages 8 & 9.)

Eastern Ontario CSPWC Members and Associates are holding a Watercolour Exhibit and Pre-Christmas Sale in Ottawa at Saint Brigid's Centre for the Arts & Humanities, 314 St. Patrick St. (use Cumberland St. entrance), from December 5th to the 13th. Viewing hours are Saturday and Sunday from 1 to 4 pm and Monday through Friday from 4 to 7 pm. Reception and meeting of artists is planned for Sunday December 6th from 1 to 4 pm.

Treasures 2009

On Thursday, October 29th, a constant stream of people crowded into the John B. Aird Gallery for the opening of *Treasures* 2009. The exhibition was a salute to ten of the CSPWC's 'treasured' life members and was a follow up to *Treasures* 2007 that also featured the work of ten life members.

Artists from across the country were represented and all but one of them were present. Michael Cleary came from Port Alberni BC, June Montgomery and Brent Laycock from Calgary, AB, Linda Finn from Elliot Lake and Jane Hunter from Sarnia, both in Ontario. They joined Margaret Squire from Mississauga and Toronto based artists Anthony J. Batten, Mary Anne Ludlam and

Rudolf Stussi. Unfortunately John Hanson from Hamilton, Ontario was ill and unable to attend.

During the formal part of the evening, Peter Marsh spoke about each artist, telling the audience something about them that wouldn't appear in the official biography posted on the wall of the gallery, and pointing out a special quality in their work. Ray Cattell, who was one of the artists honoured in *Treasures* 2007 and who was president of the CSPWC from 1977 – 79, officially opened the exhibition and cut the ribbon.

There has been continual praise for the quality and variety of the exhibition and at the time of going to press three paintings had been sold.

Although it was short notice, it was very exciting and a great privilege for me as CSPWC president to be invited to the official state dinner in honour of Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall on Wednesday November 11 at Rideau Hall. It was a grand formal occasion, and during the initial cocktail reception I was able to shake the hand of both the Governor General Michaëlle Jean, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

I was able to convey to Her Excellency our thanks for her official patronage and the appreciation of all our elected members in having their membership diplomas signed by the highest officer in the land. I was able to leave a painting for her as a gift and she was most appreciative. Her Excellency was most gracious in our short chat and was obviously proud of the society.

A short time later I was able to touch the elbow of the Prince's Equerry and he ushered me into place to shake the hand of our honorary member, his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. I found the Prince to be absolutely charming and very attentive despite the fact that he had a long line of waiting well wishers.

The encounter went something like this.

Peter: Yes Sir, you are very famous for that and the story is often told by those honoured members of the society. They had a great time chatting about watercolour painting with you.

Prince Charles: Well, I would like you to convey to your members my very best and sincerest wishes.

Peter: Yes Sir, I will be glad to do that. I was looking at some of your own paintings in your book this afternoon.

Prince Charles: Oh my goodness those paintings are 18 years old now! You really should see what I am doing

Peter: Well that would be nice. and I would like you to know that I have brought one of my own paintings for you as a gift.

Prince Charles: Ob. (looking around with an eager, excited look) Where is it?

Peter: Well you can't see it right now because I left it at the reception desk. But I'm sure you will get a chance later, and I have written you a special note about some of our artists to go along with it.

Prince Charles: Well thank you, that is very kind of you, I will look forward to that, and I do wish all your members the very best.

Peter: I would like to thank you sincerely on behalf of our members for being our honorary member, thank you. And now I am sure there are lots of other people who do want to say hello to you. Thank you.

The piece I gave the Prince was a full sheet, Muskeg Swamp in Algonquin Park, painted with The Rusty Nail Painters***, a group of eight artists from the CSPWC. I wrote a two-page article, with photographs inserted, to go with the painting, about the Rusty Nailers and their work, and also about the fun time we had painting together. I hope that it will give the Prince another solid connection to the society and an open invitation to join us at some point in the future.

It was in some respects a military dinner because it was Remembrance Day. It was also a gathering of the people who have been working on a new award to be presented under the auspices of the Governor General with regard to excellence in culinary and vintners arts. It was also an occasion for our Native People who were well represented by their National Chief Shawn A-in-chut Atleo, and a gentleman celebrating his 96th birthday who read the grace from a remarkable looking 17th century wampum belt! Leonard Gerbrandt's wife, Ute, had suggested that Patricia Smith take along her book of Prince Charles' watercolour paintings and ask him to sign it. A member of the British Press advised that - "they never do that".

However, several CSPWC members were close enough to the Prince at one occasion that Pat was able to present the book and ask him to sign it. Prince Charles must be asked these things many

times a day and had a ready answer. "I'm no good on Thursdays."

Lynn Shwadchuck then mentioned that Patricia was one of a group of members of the CSPWC and that seemed to do the

trick. The Prince asked Patricia if she was painting herself. When she replied that she did, he took the book, and commented that it was an old one. He said something about a more recent collection and signed it Charles 2009.

Leonard Gerbrandt also managed to shake hands with the Duchess of Cornwall and give her a copy of the Open Water

catalogue and the Cape Breton Symposium CD. So the CSPWC made its presence very much felt at the occasion.

2010 marks the 85th anniversary of the CSPWC, and the list of Coming Events on page 3 of this newsletter is proof that the Society is celebrating the milestone with energy and style.

We're hoping that additional events can be organized across the country to mark this great achievement.

Here are further details about some of these exhibitions and events.

LAUNCH OF NEW AWARD

At the opening of *Reflections* the CSPWC will launch a significant new award for members' exhibitions.

The CSPWC is delighted to announce that it has received a \$10,000 donation from Doris McCarthy to establish a new award. The Society has decided that the award will be used in conjunction with Exhibitions that are open to **all elected members** of the Society. [This means that regional or special exhibitions, such as the recent Treasures 2009 show, would not be eligible]. It was felt that this would be an appropriate way to honour Doris' long involvement with the CSPWC and would also provide an incentive for greater participation in national members only events.

The award will be presented to the work considered by the jurors to be "The best in show" and will therefore become the equivalent of the A.J.Casson Medal at our annual Open Water Exhibitions. The award will be known as the Doris McCarthy Award and will consist of a special diploma, currently being designed by Maurice Snelgrove, accompanied by a significant cash award.

The first Doris McCarthy Award will be presented at the opening of *Reflections* at Toronto's Robert's Gallery. The cash award on this occasion will be \$1000. The presentation will be made on July 7th, which is also the very day of Doris' 100th birthday! So there is an additional reason to celebrate.

PRIVATE VISIT TO AGO

Thanks to the efforts of Marlene Madole, a Sunday afternoon event has been added to the AGM. On May 2 at the Art Gallery of Ontario there will be a Private Open House of the Print and Study Centre for members and associates.

Those who attend will pay regular gallery admission, and then meet at a specified time and place and proceed as a group to the Study Centre. AGO volunteers will be on hand to give a brief introduction to the Centre and its collections. Members will have the opportunity to examine 15 – 20 unframed watercolours selected in consultation with past president Marlene Madole. This will be followed by a lecture/discussion relating these works to the history of the CSPWC.

Since the room can only accommodate 25 people, it is very important to RSVP. If there is sufficient demand, two sessions will be scheduled, an hour apart. Contact Joan at the CSPWC office if you would like to attend.

Members' Exhibition by Alan Darling

Reflections, the 85th anniversary national exhibition of work by elected members, will be held at the Roberts Gallery in Toronto. Jurors will be Paul Wildridge from the Roberts Gallery, Marc Gagnon, Past President of the CSPWC and Bill Rogers, A. J. Casson Award winner of Open Water 2009. The exhibition will be held from July 7 to August 4. Please note the change of dates from the announcement in the last newsletter. Entry information will be available soon and we hope you'll participate.

In Memoriam MARILYN MERCER

The CSPWC was saddened to learn recently that Marilyn Mercer had passed away in May. Marilyn came to painting later in life, and by accident. She lived in Deep River in Northern Ontario and signed up for an evening class. She discovered that they were offering two classes for the price of one, but didn't know what else to take. The Registrar suggested that there was a watercolour class she might try. Marilyn did and was hooked. At a workshop at Geneva Park she was taught by CSPWC Past President, Chuck Burns, who highly recommended the work of Zoltan Szabo. Marilyn moved with her husband, Joe, further south to Bobcaygeon and opened

a studio there. Wintering in Florida, she met Szabo, and immediately invited him to give workshops in Canada. She organized many workshops in her area with Szabo and other noted instructors. After being elected to the CSPWC in 1998, she immediately became a very active member of the Board driving in to meetings with Chuck. Heart problems forced her to resign from the Board, but they never stopped her love of life and her vibrant paintings.



In Memoriam

PETER KOLISNYK

Former CSPWC member, Peter Kolisnyk, passed away on October 22, 2009. Born in Toronto in 1934 Peter was a member of the CSPWC from 1961 - 2003. He was a minimalist artist with a distinctly pure style and his work has been exhibited across Canada. The Art Gallery of Ontario toured a solo exhibition



of his work in 1980. For many years he was associated with the Station Gallery, Whitby, as a donor, an exhibiting artist and a popular experimental painting instructor.

FROM THE LIBRARY OF **CHARLES COMFORT**

From Sept 16 to Dec 24, the vestibule of the National Gallery of Canada Library and Archives features a display of books from the library of Charles Comfort.

Comfort was a distinguished Canadian artist who served as Director of the National Gallery from 1960 to 1965. His long career was marked by friendships with many Canadian artists, service abroad as an official war artist and steadfast commitment to artistic practice and teaching.

He was also a Charter Member and then a Life Member of the CSPWC joining the organization in 1926, and remaining a member until his death in 1994. He served the organization as President from 1950 - 52 He was a noted portrait painter, and the Charles Comfort Medal, given at CSPWC Open

Water exhibitions for an outstanding figurative work, honours his memory.

His personal library reflects a multitude of interests and associations forged during a lifetime devoted to the arts in Canada. The display shows 32 items selected from the 800 or more in the collection of the archives and several of these have a connection with the CSPWC. One is an inscribed book given to him by Carl Schaefer, CSPWC President 1939-41, on the occasion of Comfort's honorary induction into the Arts & Letters Club of Toronto in 1978. There is also a 1944 book illustrated by F. H. Brigden, CSPWC president from 1926-28.

The exhibition is open from Wednesday to Friday 10 am - 4.45 pm.On Thursday, it is open until 5:45.

Opportunities for Artists

News on the Arts

KURULEK PAINTING RETURNS TO CANADA

King of the Castle, a winter scene of children playing on a snow mountain, was painted in 1958 while Kurulek was living in England, and given away as a farewell gift before his return to Canada. Now valued at \$300,000 the painting has been purchased by Mayberry Fine Art in Winnipeg, and was on display at the gallery throughout November. In 2011 it will be part of a Kurulek retrospective at the Winnipeg Art Gallery.

MOMA BREAKS WITH THE PAST

Ann Temkin, the new chief curator of painting and sculpture, feels that the framing convention has domesticated some of the MOMA's paintings and obscured their radicalism and she ordered the frames removed. She also frequently renews the 'permanent collection' opting for a fluidity and constant rhythm of change, so that new works are seen and old ones viewed in a new light.

OAAG AWARDS

The late David Somers, former curator of the Art Gallery of Peel, was posthumously awarded the OAAG Silver Pin Award. The Ontario Association of Art Galleries sponsors these awards that range from Exhibition of the Year, to Curatorial Writing, to Art Book and Film of the Year, to design for books, periodicals and newsletters.

VISUAL ARTISTS HOPE TO RESOLVE IMPASSE WITH NATIONAL GALLERY

In late October, visual artists (represented by CARFAC and RAAV) sat down with the National Gallery of Canada in the hope of resolving a bargaining impasse about artists' fees that has been outstanding for two years.

A TIME FOR ART BARGAINS?

Art prices have tumbled in the last year. Guarantees are no longer being offered to sellers at auction, and thick catalogues and lavish parties have also disappeared. On the whole, collectors are holding on to their work unless forced to sell by one of the three D's - death, divorce or debt.

MAJOR ART PRIZES ANNOUNCED

Winnipeg artist, Andrew Valko, is the winner of the \$10,000 Kingston Prize, a national portrait competition. Personal Surveillance depicts a young man turning a video camera on himself. Runners up were Allan Harding MacKay of Kitchener and Fiona Ackerman of Vancouver. Toronto artist, Sherry Boyle, won the \$25,000 Gershon Iskowitz Prize sponsored by the Art Gallery of Ontario and the Gershon Iskowitz Foundation. An exhibition of Boyle's work will be at the AGO. David Altmeid, a Quebec-trained, New York based sculptor and installation artist, won the \$50,000 Sobey Art Award for an emerging artist. His winning piece is a sculptural image of werewolves.

WORLD WATERCOLOUR DAY

During November, Associate Member Lorraine P. Dietrich had a solo exhibition, Exubérance, at the Vigneault Art Gallery, in Repentiony, near Montreal. On November 21st and 22nd, she painted at the gallery in celebration of World Watercolour Day.

The Ottawa Region of the CSPWC celebrated World Watercolour Day on Sunday November 22nd from 2 to 4 pm with a Paint-In in the foyer of the Ottawa School of Art at 35 George Street. Paper and paints were on hand for the public to try the medium.
