Telling Tales

Regional exhibitions and events are

critical to increasing awareness of the

medium and reinforcing the value of

watercolour's voice for story telling.

As a Society, we have a plethora of stories to tell. Beginning years ago with our noteworthy founders, the plotline has continued through the years and we now have a wonderful history about art and artists. The CSPWC has just finished celebrating its 85th year, but I wonder where our story will go next?

The why and how of using watercolours has changed over the years. Once there were explorers using paints to describe the terrain of newly discovered lands, to explain the details of the botanical treasures they found or to record the fascinating indigenous people they met in their travels. War artists rarely start with paints now in telling their stories.

The mediums and methods of visual story telling are changing but the language of art is still our language. Our understanding of art and the mastery of this specific medium will hold us in good stead. We know and understand watercolour: the verbosity of red, the calm of blue, the pause of shape and the excitement of line. These are our tools for creating the stories we individually tell. Sharing these stories and helping others learn to use our language is the key to the future.

We are a charitable organization and by law cannot exist solely for the benefit of our members. The promotion of art, per se, is not a charitable purpose. However, the courts have held that education in the arts, either in the form of training individuals or in the education of the public

through the raising of its aesthetic tastes by the direct exhibition or presentation of artistic works, is a charitable purpose.

It is in this respect that *Open Water* remains a pivotal part of our programming. As a national organization, we are gifted with the opportunity to share a diversity of histories, cultures and colours

in our visual storytelling. But very importantly, the regions create our plot lines and our story building blocks. Regional exhibitions and events are critical to increasing awareness of the medium and reinforcing the value of watercolour's voice for story telling. We speak "watercolour" and the symposiums we organize help us teach others this language. Respect follows understanding, and the inherent value of watercolour increases as its use as a means of expression is shared.

I look forward to working with the regions to find ways to expand the awareness and understanding of this wonderful medium. Sharing and showing the best of the best, finding new approaches to exhibiting, fostering new learners and supporting the collective appreciation of idea sharing – the story will continue on in exciting new ways.

For those of you who were able to join us in Ottawa, I hope that you will find it a compelling week of activities encouraging you to share skills, explore ideas, learn new techniques, see exhibitions and of course, tell stories of all kinds.



Newly Elected Life Member: ELMAR DAMBERGS

Elmar Dambergs needs no introduction in the District of Parry Sound. For decades his name has been synonymous with national and international, award-winning cartooning. His cartoons in the Parry Sound North Star good-heartedly and poignantly have lampooned most of our foibles. He's also made considerable fun of himself, his wife, and his ever-faithful dog who accompanies him while he rakes the leaves, rows a boat, or goes painting in the bay. For over 50 years he's also written a scholarly column giving opinions and reviews of the work of many artists, and occasionally reviewing an exhibition of the CSPWC. His name has also been famous in the Latvian press for over four decades.

At 86 years of age, Elmar has been a member of the CSPWC since 1964 and he was exhibiting with the society as early as 1959 alongside the legendary names of our founding and Charter members many of whom he painted with.

Elmar has a painting in the CSPWC Diploma Collection, and in the Royal Collection at Windsor castle. In 1992 he received a Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada.

We are delighted to welcome Elmar as a Life Member of the Society for his continuing contribution to the excellence




The Pin, Elmar's Diploma Collection painting

Meet The New Members

MANON BOISVERT (Beaconsfield, QC) paints simple objects and life forms: a colourful bird, a textured wall, a rusty old lock. But she is searching for something outside of the day-to-day: an emotional response, excitement, a curiosity in subject matter that others might walk past and never notice. This kindles a passion that she hopes will inspire and surprise others as much as it does her. Intuition and the artistic eye inform her painting. While there is a detailed pictorial representation in her work, she also wants to capture the mystery and spirituality she finds in nature and in the apparent harshness of the inner-city environment. She believes that observing nature's adaptation to the challenges of the urban environment provides solace and meaning to our hectic modern lives. To look at a painting and perhaps understand what has occurred in one's life, may grant us peace at that moment.







BARRY HERNIMAN (Ross-on-Wye, Herefordshire, England) started his career as a draughtsman and surveyor before immigrating to South Africa and working in advertising. Returning to England in 1980 he obtained a diploma in Information Design and set up his own graphics company. His first solo exhibition of watercolours of the Wye Valley was in 1991. Since then he has travelled extensively gathering reference material and inspiration for his paintings. He won the Artist of the Year with the SAA in 2001. He has given many workshops in Spain, Tuscany, Tenby, Wye Valley and New England and released a two part instructional video Rivers, Hills & Valleys I & 2 that was released in 2002. He has also published two books, Painting Mood and Atmosphere and Successful and Creative Washes. His workshops continue to be popular and include locales like the Nile and the wild coast of the Dingle Peninsula in southwest Ireland.

SANDY KAY (Vancouver, BC) worked as a graphic designer, and theatre set and costume designer before starting her own company designing and manufacturing the largest line of nautical-themed greeting cards in the USA. In the early 1990's she opened a gallery/studio in Florida, exhibited widely and won many awards. She is a lifetime member of the Florida Watercolor Society and recently was awarded 2nd place in their on-line show. In 1999 she moved to Vancouver and operated a studio gallery for four years on Granville Island. She is an Active Signature Member of the Federation of Canadian Artists, serving as Treasurer of the Board since 2007. Working in classic and contemporary styles, she combines creativity with solid technical skills. Her art is emotion based, striving to capture a sense of place in our rapidly changing world.

BONNIE SCOTT (Calgary, AB) is primarily a watercolour artist and has maintained an active studio practice for over a decade. She is moved by light falling on surfaces, relationships between cool and warm colours, the alchemy of sheers of transparent paint on white paper, and the tension provided by the unpredictability and unruly nature of watercolour. Colour is an important element in her paintings – not necessarily the local colour, but colour expressing a mood that enriches the painting. Her focus is on the landscape and still life and she takes joy in making the invisible visible, revealing the unexpected, and opening worlds of possibility to the eye and spirit. Whether done in the studio or in plein air, the vibrancy of colour, the shimmer of forms and the excitement of life all combine to provide inspiration for her artistic journey.

INAE KIM (Halifax, NS) was born in South Korea. She graduated from university with a BFA and a teaching certificate and for a number of years taught art at elementary and junior high schools as well as working as a commercial artist. In 1996 she immigrated to Canada with her husband and two children and settled in Halifax. While taking up a new life in a new country can be challenging she has found the varied cultural experiences rewarding and feels that it has expanded her understanding as an artist. Light, colour, shape and imagery are key elements in her approach to painting. The diversity of Nova Scotia's flora and fauna provide special inspiration, as does the historical architecture of Halifax and the province. She has exhibited widely in Nova Scotia, winning several awards and accolades for her work.

JOEL SINCLAIR (Langdon, AB) From an early age Joel interacted with the natural environment and with the influence of his father, CSPWC member Robert Sinclair, was also immersed in the art world and exposed to many modes of creative expression. He attended the Alberta College of Art and Design and then started a successful web design firm. But after 12 years he made the decision to step away from computers and immerse himself in creativity and spirituality. He works with watercolour in a nontraditional manner as an exploration of flow, energy, texture and spirit. He tries to avoid 'perfect' renderings by exaggerating brush strokes and colour to create the feeling and energy of place. The motivation for his work is the relationship of man and nature and the memory of our own place in creation. He works plein air and out of Tangerine Leaf Studio and Gallery in Art Central, Calgary.

MARSHALL SUMKA (Calgary, AB) has been exhibiting for thirty years and becomes a CSPWC member after having work accepted in three Open Water exhibitions. He studied ceramics at CEGEP in Montreal and followed up taking drawing and ceramics at the Alberta College of Art. After a two year Artist residency at the Banff Centre he obtained a BA, a BEd and an MLIS from the University of Alberta. He has had excellent notices for his work, has acted as Assistant Curator for the McDougall Collection at Alberta Culture, and was a Session Instructor in Canadian Art History at the University of Alberta. From 1997 he has been a studio member with the North Mount Pleasant Arts Centre.

ANDREW CHEDDIE SOOKRAH (Toronto, ON) was born in Guyana, South America and immigrated to Canada in 1974. He is the owner and creative director of Engine Room Creative, a creative and design development studio in Toronto. He is an active member of the Arts & Letters Club, and an elected member of the Ontario Society of Artists, the Portrait Society of Canada and the Society of Canadian Artists. He has exhibited widely in group shows and has had several solo exhibitions. Whether representational, expressive, or abstract, his works are all the result of an interview: a greeting, an exchange of pleasantries, a search for connection. This is followed by the simultaneous opening: at times tentative, at times confident. More often than not without thought. This opens up to the twoway free flow of information, sometimes accurate, at times not. Then comes the agreement.

LIN SOULIERE (Lion's Head, ON) studied fine art at the University of Waterloo and has worked as a fine artist for over 40 years. She has exhibited widely, winning many awards. Lin becomes a member by having been accepted in three CSPWC annual open juried exhibitions, winning the Daler-Rowney Award in 2008. Her work has appeared in a number of children's books and before moving to the Bruce Peninsula in 1996, she owned and operated The Turquoise Dolphin Gallery in Stratford. She now paints and teaches from Dragonfly Ridge, her studio. In her work Lin looks for interesting shapes, patterns and light in the landscape. She likes to use colours in layers, allowing the shape and light to dominate, focusing on the way shapes interconnect, and relying on strong negative shapes to form the composition. In her watercolours she works to have the image project light.

GAIL SUTHERLAND (Bedford, NS) is originally from Montreal where she obtained a Fine Arts degree at John Abbott College, then completed her BFA at Concordia University, specializing in graphic design. She has lived in Bedford for nineteen years. Gail chooses to paint in watercolour for its fluidity, transparency, and unpredictable nature. Nova Scotia's diverse landscapes and people are the catalyst for most of her paintings. She sketches, photographs and when time permits, paints on location. She then uses this information in the privacy of her studio as a departure point for her work. In describing her process she says: To simplify, to focus, To balance the seen with the unseen, To capture the spirit, heart & soul..., The painting's reason for being. UPDATE: CSPWC ON THE WEB

There are now Wikipedia files on The Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour and on the A. J. Casson Award.

The file on the Society gives a basic history of the medium on Canadian territory and the development of the CSPWC/SCPA since 1925. It also includes a list of all the Presidents: a rather grand list of names! The page on the A.J. Casson Award includes all winners of the medal and of the diploma that preceded it. Any member whose name appears on these lists is encouraged to link their own media information/web site to their name. If you don't know how to do this the programmer who put the pages up on line will do this for a minimum one-hour fee.

As reported at the AGM the third Wikipedia page on the seventy-five paintings by CSPWC/SCPA members that are housed in the Royal Collection at Windsor Castle should be up shortly. Look for the CSPWC/SCPA Royal Collection Project and again if a member is represented in that body of work they should cross reference their own media sites to the appropriate work in the list of artists.

The Royal Collection is also in the process of creating a website for their extensive collection. It is a slow process that will take a number of years since the collection owns hundreds of thousands of individual works. They are photographing each piece and making a readily accessible website where an image will come up against every inventory number. It is quite understandable that we are quite a long way down the priority list when you consider that there are for example over six hundred Da Vinci drawings in the same room as our "Canadian Gift," but we are thrilled to have been given the individual Royal Collection Inventory numbers [RCIN] for all seventy-five works by CSPWC members that are part of this Collection. Our turn will come.

CALL FOR NEW MEMBERS

This past year we had the lowest number of applicants for membership in recent memory: twenty-three. I think we can do better. We need to do better. If you know of any good watercolourists who are not members, please suggest that they apply for membership.

The application form is on the CSPWC web site www.cspwc.com. Potential applicants need only go to the 'Become a Member' link to access the application form that contains all the information needed to apply. The annual deadline for applications to be submitted to the Toronto office is November 1.

A typical response heard when suggesting someone apply is: "I'm not good enough yet." I suggest that they let the jury decide that.

Another common response is: "What's in it for me?" The answer is that the benefits are numerous:

- A new member joins a select group of professional watercolourists, and enjoys camaraderie and support from peers
- Members meet some wonderful fellow watercolour artists from all across Canada
- Members receive reduced entry fees to Open Water Exhibitions and Symposiums

- Members are eligible to enter Members' Exhibitions and participate in major national and international activities
- Members may use the initials CSPWC after their names
- Members receive the society quarterly *Watercolour News*
- Membership is a recognized watercolour painting teaching credential

In other words, Elected Membership opens doors. So this plea is not just about numbers. It's about the best watercolour artists becoming part of, and contributing to the future of the society.

The 2011 edition of *Open Water* is a water

based media exhibition. For the purposes of the exhibition the definition is:

The paint is resoluble in water (artist's quality watercolour paint, applied transparently or opaquely; and/or gouache) and there may be a pencil drawing. The paint surface is an organic fibre paper, including watercolour paper mounted on board, with no varnish applied. Only media listed in the definition above are permissible. Application will be by hand, brush or any tool by the artists and without mechanical assistance.

Works on Yupo paper will not be accepted.

The jurors are former A.J. Casson Medal winners, Linda Kemp and John Inglis and the outside juror is David P. Silcox, noted author, Senior Fellow Massey College, and President of Sotheby's Canada. Awards totaling over \$10,000 will be given out.

Remember that the deadline for submission is August 26, 2011. You might want to consider getting your entry in early before summer activities take over.

NEWS ON THE ARTS

CHINESE ARTIST AI WEIWEI DETAINED

China's best-known artist who designed the Olympic Bird's Nest stadium, and created the Sunflower Seeds installation for the Tate Modern, is also an outspoken critic of the Chinese government. In April he was detained by the government as he left for a business meeting in Hong Kong. In response a protest was held in London that included pictures of sunflower seeds bearing the names of 50 Chinese dissidents and artists who have been detained or disappeared.

THEFT AT TORONTO YORKVILLE GALLERY

Early in April robbers smashed the front window of the Odon Wagner Gallery and grabbed three paintings worth \$73,000.

McMICHAEL GALLERY HAS NEW DIRECTOR

In mid-April Victoria Dickenson took her position as the new Executive Director and Chief Executive Officer of the McMichael Canadian Collection in Kleinburg. She comes to the gallery from the Canadian Museum for Human Rights in Winnipeg and previous to that spent 11 years at the head of the McCord Museum of Canadian History in Montreal. She arrives at an auspicious time. Early in May the McGuinty government introduced legislation to free the collection from some of the constraints its been operating under for the last ten years.
