

News on the Arts

CUTS IN TORONTO

In Mayor Ford's search for "gravy" several frightening suggestions concerning the arts have been made. One would have "saved" \$6 million by completely cutting all direct grants to major arts institutions including \$540,000 to the AGO. Thankfully, the folly of this seems to have been realized, but there are still ominous possibilities like selling off all three city owned theatres and, more troubling to artists, eliminating all grants less than \$10,000.

VANCOUVER BAILS OUT PLAYHOUSE AND MUSEUM OF VANCOUVER

Provincially, BC has experienced severe arts cuts in the last year and a half – but Vancouver has stepped in to bail out these two important civic cultural institutions because of their importance to the cultural life of the city.

TOM THOMSON AND THE GROUP OF SEVEN ON TOUR

Painting Canada: Tom Thomson and the Group of Seven, will be at the Dulwich Picture Gallery in London from Oct 16 - Jan 8. It then tours to the National Museum of Art. Architecture and Design in Oslo (Jan 29 - May 13) and the Groninger Museum in the Netherlands (Jun 3 - Oct 28). The exhibition is the largest collection of works by these artists ever exhibited internationally and includes paintings from many public and private collections.

ART GALLERY OF PEEL RE-OPENS

Spring 2012 is new re-opening date for the Peel Heritage Gallery. This will mean that the CSPWC Diploma collection will once again be open to additions, viewing by appointment, and loans.


TRAVELS WITH THE FLAG

In July, Jake Mol and I attended the Salon de l'aquarelle de Belgique held in the Expo Pavilion in Namur, Belgium, Four hundred and twenty artists submitted works, 202 were accepted, and 533 watercolour paintings were exhibited. It was an impressive show with many outstanding watercolours. Canada was represented by several Ouebec artists.

The show was well attended by the public and there were a respectable number of sales. Although the majority of paintings were done on paper and framed the usual way, there were quite a few done on canvas and paper, then varnished and exhibited both with and without frames.

It was gratifying to see the respect and importance given to watercolours with an exhibit of this huge scope. It would be great to see such an exhibition someday in Canada.



JOHN HANSON

CSPWC Life Member, John Hanson, passed away on Friday June 3. John was born May 7th 1920 in Hamilton, Ontario. While attending Memorial School, his art teacher, Viola Depew, encouraged him to pursue an art education. His father was against it, but Viola took up the cause and was very convincing!

At Hamilton Technical College he worked under Jean Wishart and John Sloan. During the depression, he began offering full window coverings for storefronts. Walter Thompson gave him two jobs: to design a Turkish Delight wrapper and a flyer for Firestone. He liked what John did so much he paid \$10 for each and hired

After serving in the Air Force for 6 years, John knew art was his life! He was hired by a paper packaging company, and became the commercial art director for 5 studios and 27

> employees. This allowed him the freedom to paint in his spare time.

John was well known in the art community, teaching at Mohawk College and in Oakville. His one-man show at the Art Gallery of Hamilton sold almost every painting. He also sold every piece related to the houses that were demolished to build Jackson Square. His favourite subjects were horses, hunting, sailing, fishing, regattas, houses and scenery. He said: "My objective is a personal viewpoint, an image painted with passion realistically." He described himself as a life painter: the piece has to talk for itself, it is real and it stands in time.

John was elected to the CSPWC in 1981. For many years he served on the Executive and for several of these he was the editor of Watercolour News. He participated in many exhibitions including Open Water, International Waters and Treasures II.

MERCEDES HORNE by Joanne Lucas Warren

The CSPWC was saddened to hear of the death on May 8th of Mercèdés Horne (1925 - 2011). Elected to the CSPWC in 1969, Mercèdés was also a member of the RCA, the OSA, the Jacksonville Watercolor Society and the St. Augustine Art Association. She served for several years as a member of the CSPWC executive and as a juror. In 1977 she received the Queen Elizabeth II Medal.

From 1960 – 1985 she had many solo exhibitions in the GTA and exhibited nationally in many group shows.

I was introduced to her abstract work several years ago by a printer who was working on a book, Catalogue of Creativity, that had been commissioned by her family. For many years she had been ill in a senior's home in Oakville and her family wanted to keep her memory and her art alive.

The book is now available to download at www.mercedeshorne.com. The Horne family will be donating one of Mercèdés paintings to the CSPWC permanent collection.


