



#### IMPORTANT! our Certificate of Continuance and revised by-laws

You may have already received by now various attachments to an important email which deals with our **Certificate of Continuance**. The Constitution and By-Laws Committee has been working hard to assemble the papers required by the federal government under the auspices of the new Canada Not-For-Profit Corporations Act (2009). The Committee and The Board recommend that you vote in favour of the resolution which will be presented at The Annual General Meeting. In order to conform to the new act and continue as a corporation we have answered the questions posed in the application in the appropriate manner. We have also made some small revisions to our by-laws. Both the by-laws and the application for a Certificate of Continuance will be sent to the government once the resolution, with a two thirds majority, is passed at our Annual General Meeting on May 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2014. Once this is completed we will then be entitled to make a submission to the Canada Revenue Agency to maintain our "charitable status".

If it sounds complicated it isn't. All you need to do is read over the documents, which were previously mailed to you, and fill out the proxy vote form and return it as instructed before the AGM.

Your assistance is requested and appreciated in getting this process completed. Thank You.

If you are unable to attend the meeting, you may vote by proxy (please see the Proxy Vote Form pg 1 & 2, following this page).






To date, the Greeting Card Campaign has raised more than \$726,900 and helped 54 charities across Canada.

The new curator of prints and drawings at Windsor Castle, Martin Clayton, recently informed us that the seventy five watercolours by CSPWC members that they hold will shortly be photographed by the Royal Collection. Those images will be placed along-side the related inventory references and should be accessible online by this summer.

This program of photographing the entire holdings of the Royal Collection is a major ongoing project and a recent exchange of correspondence with the CSPWC re-jigged our position on that schedule. We have been moved to the front of the line!!

A reminder to members not represented in the CSPWC collection at Windsor castle that in 2025, the Society's centennial year, a final additional portfolio of 25 works will be juried and then gifted to the Monarch and the Royal Collection. A unique opportunity to add being in one of the greatest collections in the world to your biography!!!

# Can You Make a Contribution?

The CSPWC/SCPA Endowment Fund operates under the umbrella of The Toronto Community Foundation. It is probably the most important factor contributing to a stable financial future for the CSPWC/SCPA. The fund has been in operation since 2011 but it takes considerable time for people to join in the effort and to understand the importance of an endowment fund. Firstly, any money you donate will never be spent. Only the interest is spent. This is a very important point since a multitude of contributions will remain in operation in perpetuity. Additionally, the fiduciary responsibilities in terms of security and audit are maintained for the most-part by the Toronto Community Foundation, which eliminates ongoing responsibilities for our volunteer board on a yearly basis. Personally I donate \$5 a month. It sounds like a small amount until one adds up the years that I have been doing this. If every member did this we would have a considerable sum of cash which would be enlarging in effectiveness on an ongoing basis. I know it would not be easy for some members to do this, but if it was done by those who can afford to do it, it would be appreciated by all those who would like to see our era leave a legacy for the future. Individuals make their contribution to the society in many different ways. If you can make any sort of donation to our endowment fund I urge you to do it. # John Singer Sargent Watercolour Exhibition

He was a contemporary of Monet and the impressionists and although he knew them his style was his own. He was known primarily as an oil portraitist. He completed over 900 portraits and was the most sought after painter of the rich and famous in the US and England. He was in the enviable position of being able to consistently raise his prices and still have people flock to him.

In the last 25 years of his life he became worn out by the demands of portraiture and

increasingly turned to watercolour. In watercolour he found a freedom and directness that was not present in his portrait work. To do his portraits he required anywhere from 8 to 15 or

more sittings, often over a long period of time and his clients could be very demanding. We get a glimpse of the pressure he felt in pleasing clients when he said "A portrait is a picture in which there is just a tiny little something not quite right about the mouth" or "Every time I paint a

portrait I lose a friend". Portraits were his work, watercolour was his pleasure.

He travelled extensively, always with his watercolours at hand, and he painted virtually whatever he saw. I think it can fairly be said of him that he simply lived to paint.

When you see his watercolours in person you clearly see how he pushed the limits of the medium. He was interested in capturing his subjects quickly and boldly and he freely used any technique

that would be of service including wax resist, lifting out, opaque watercolour and especially white gouache often applied so thickly that in some paintings it seems to have been squashed down by the glass.

This style of applying paint very thickly is called impasto and in the detail image you can see how thick his paint was sometimes applied. I found some of his paintings to be of particular interest.

Bedouins is one of his most famous images. From the wonderfully expressive faces to the bold, vibrant colour this painting pushes the very nature of watercolour. A Tramp is an absolutely masterful watercolour portrait. The face is transfixing. Sargent was above all a painter of light. Corfu:

**Lights & Shadows** displays Sargent's love affair with light. He beautifully captures the intense sun of Corfu.

Sargent always travelled with a group of family and friends and they were all enlisted as

models. In Simplon Pass: The Tease his niece was posed with an older woman. As in his oil work he loved painting women's dresses.

Finally Gourds illustrates his ability to represent very complicated subjects such as this complex background quickly and directly. With his dabs and dashes of colour and opaque paint he captures the mass of foliage and the sense of light beneath these trees.

I was inspired by his work and as a watercolourist I completely

related to his love of this very special medium. I was also intrigued by his life which was devoted exclusively and completely to painting.

I visited Paris several years ago. I spent over a week prowling the Louvre, the Musee d'Orsay and other Art museums. It was a period of true personal enlightenment. And what did I learn? That there are many, many different ways to perceive and interpret the world around us. Simple eh? And yet if you are an artist it is a "Truth" of the utmost importance to fully appreciate.

I have heard many art students discussing how they wanted to learn to paint in a particular style. Style is not a vision. It is transitory, a reflection of crowd thinking and current fashion - not individual insight. It is a paradox, but to find your own vision you must search not only the world around you but the work of other artists whose paintings speak to you.

In choosing an art workshop it is a good idea to look not only at an instructor's background and credentials but perhaps most importantly his/her examples of paintings. It is not a competition of who does the most impressive work. Rather it is a question of whose work most closely coincides with where you want to go with your own painting.

You can learn by asking yourself "What do these paintings display that touches me?" Selecting those visual characteristics that excite you will influence your own vision. But be realistic and honest with yourself. Your vision is also a reflection of your temperament. If you admire a portrait that was carefully and meticulously planned and painted, but your drawing skills are not first rate and your innate nature is passionate and carefree rather than patient and precise-enjoy it and learn what you can from the portrait painting. But continue to examine other painters for a more empathetic match with yourself.

Because while observing the works of others is of great benefit your Personal Vision will ultimately be determined by your own understanding of what moves you. In your own painting ask yourself:

"What is it I want to say? What technical skills do I possess? How can I improve on them? What is my innate temperament? Which artists paint in a manner I would be comfortable emulating? And what medium is best suited to my own visual message?"

# **Now Is The Time**



Most organizations need a critical mass to make them viable entities in terms of effectiveness. For example there are not many organizations that could run with only two people as members. That's exaggerating, of course, but it makes the point clearly. The CSPWC/SCPA sports a membership large enough at present to keep it viable, and for clarity and understanding let's say it is approximately 250 paying members. I'm not sure what the average age of the membership is but I would guess it is around 60. Demographics is starting to be an important consideration when looking at our future. Life expectancy in Canada is 80. So on average we can expect that on average most of our present members will no longer be around in 2034. It is a bit astounding to think that this may be true but that is what demographics is all about. In all likelihood it is indeed true, on average, even if it isn't deadly accurate, pardon the pun.



Now would be a good time to consider what might be done to keep the Society viable over the next twenty years. I am not that great at math, and I am certainly not a statistician, but one could say

simply that we will need on average an increase of at least ten new members per year to maintain the status quo. That is not exactly true because not everybody in this cohort is about to die tomorrow, but the numbers will definitely increase as the years



increase and it is inevitable. So although no members may pass away in the following five years, we may in the later stages of this progression have 20 or more members per year who hang up their paint brush for good.

Now would be a good time to start looking for ways to increase our membership at a better rate than we have been doing for the last ten years. We will need to be creative and industrious to get this done. We will need not only to find the watercolour painters who might be members but also to make sure

that they know about our national society. We need to encourage them to become associates and submit their work to the jury process. If the process is a bit cumbersome we may need to revise it. If people

can't travel the distances needed we may need to find ways around it. If there are not enough opportunities for non-members to participate and get interested we may have to devise new opportunities for exhibiting and camaraderie. If prize money is a membership 'carrot' we may have to think about increases in prize money for our national "Open Water" exhibition. All this will be needed just to sustain our society at a viable level.

When one considers the vast array of watercolour artists in this country of approximately 35 million people, we have hardly scraped the surface in terms of possible members. Think about it, the ratio works out to about 140,000:1. The things presently in our favour are; the population



continues to increase at a steady rate, there is vast potential for new members, The Society is comprised of a superb collection of painters, the members are very welcoming to all who are new, the benefits of belonging to The Society are numerous in terms of personal satisfaction and great exhibition opportunities.

Now is the time to switch to a determined mindset that will guarantee The Society as a viable national entity over the foresæable future.

We should plan for 'Come and See' events all over the country in each region. We should think about cross-cultural development in our multicultural societies across the country. We should ask ourselves are we truly national in our thinking and our outlook

Now is the time.


