







#### **Ted Nuttall Workshop**

In August Susan and I went again to the Madeline Island School Of The Arts, an island in Lake Superior just off the Wisconsin coast, to take a workshop with Ted Nuttall. I originally became familiar with his work through the Watercolor Artist Magazine and the Splash series. Since I am becoming more interested in portraits this was an opportunity not to be missed. Ted is a very generous and friendly guy and we really connected.

He has a unique approach to portraits as can be seen in the close up of one of his paintings. To draw attention to important parts of the face he uses what he calls 'sloppy dots'. Up close it looks unusual but from a distance it just makes for

an inviting image. I learned so much from the workshop and will be exploring those ideas for a while to come.

He sells his work primarily through his workshops and he had a number of originals and giclees available. This image absolutely captivated me and we have ordered a giclee. The original sells for \$4500.

Madeline Island is a very interesting location and this workshop was a wonderful experience.

Rex was also very honoured to have the opportunity to teach a wonderful workshop for the Toronto Watercolour


Society. He also did a demo for the first meeting of the year for the TWS. This was the largest group he had ever demoed for.

### Can You Make a Contribution?

The CSPWC/SCPA Endowment Fund operates under the umbrella of The Toronto Community Foundation. It is probably the most important factor contributing to a stable financial future for the CSPWC/SCPA. The fund has been in operation since 2011 but it takes considerable time for people to join in the effort and to understand the importance of an endowment fund. Firstly, any money you donate will never be spent. Only the interest is spent. This is a very important point since a multitude of contributions will remain in operation in perpetuity. Additionally, the fiduciary responsibilities in terms of security and audit are maintained for the most-part by the Toronto Community Foundation, which eliminates ongoing responsibilities for our volunteer board on a yearly basis. Personally I donate \$5 a month. It sounds like a small amount until one adds up the years that I have been doing this. If every member did this we would have a considerable sum of cash which would be enlarging in effectiveness on an ongoing basis. I know it would not be easy for some members to do this, but if it was done by those who can afford to do it, it would be appreciated by all those who would like to see our era leave a legacy for the future. Individuals make their contribution to the society in many different ways. If you can make any sort f donation to our endowment fund I urge you to do it. It is the most effective way we can improve the future financial well-being of the Society. - Peter Marsh






Nora Gross—On the Cabot Trail in Cape Breton


### Tibor Nyilasi



Tibor Nyilasi of Hamilton, Ontario (1936-2015), CSPWC member since [?], was absolutely dedicated to exploring the beauty and challenges of watercolour painting. An immigrant from Hungary (1956) who graduated from the Ontario College of Art in 1964, Tibor was taught by some of Canada's top artists. He went on to work as an artist and art teacher in a career that spanned more than 50 years. Tibor developed the ability to work "wet-on-wet" - a water-soaked brush on soaking wet watercolour paper – and used this not for landscape painting (he often scoffed, "If the bush doesn't turn out, just turn it into a tree") but

rather for courageous and anatomically precise figure studies and even crowd scenes. A trip to Japan had introduced him to Sumie painting, and he often used a bamboo stick to overlay India ink line work into his compositions. Tibor had an uncanny ability to know exactly how far wet pigment would spread on a soaking wet imperial-size sheet of heavy Arches paper. He used negative space on the paper, wax resist, and created patterns both with embossed paper towels and with salt. Tibor's genius was matched with his friendly and encouraging disposition, his














singing. He would complain, "Why do I have to wash my hands and clothes? Watercolour paint isn't dirt, it's gold!"

### Morton Baslaw



Morton Baslaw 1924-2016 It is with great sadness that we pass along the news of the passing of Morton Baslaw who was a major figure in the growth and development of the Ottawa School of Art. In 1943, he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and was trained as an Air Force photographer, serving in England, Holland, Belgium, Germany and France. While on duty, he drew cartoons for the air force magazine. All of Morton's pay cheques from the Air Force were sent home to support his parents.

Morton returned in 1945 and attended the Chicago Academy of Fine Art where he studied cartooning. It was in Chicago that the school's Director, Ruth Van Sickle Ford, introduced him to watercolour. He graduated from the Chicago Academy of Fine Art in 1948 and returned to Ottawa where he opened his first graphic design studio. Morton's graphic design company grew and flourished through the 1950's and 1960's with major clients like Canada Post, the Boy Scouts of Canada and Macies.

Morton also created designs for Expo 67 and for the opening of the National Arts Centre. During this time Morton continued his devotion to watercolour and painted on holidays and weekends. He developed his unique style that was marked by its intense attention to detail and colour. His work focused on landscapes and interpretive realism that were

painted on location. He had his first solo exhibition, "Creativity Among Us" at the JCC in 1966. Soon after he was named an Exhibiting Member of the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolour and the Ontario Society of Artists. After his solo show, his work was displayed at the Art Gallery of Ontario and the Cultural Branch of the Government of Alberta. Morton began teaching at OSA in 1972 where he taught for over 35 years. In 1976 he founded and was the first president of the Ottawa Watercolour Society and guided the society to its first exhibition in 1977.

His artwork also received much deserved recognition at this time and he exhibited his work extensively with the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolour and the Ontario Society of Artists, becoming a permanent member of these prestigious organizations in 1970 and 1974 respectively. In 1978, Morton became the President of the Board of Directors of the Ottawa School of Art and led a major building campaign that saw the school raise the money needed to renovate and move into its main campus building at 35 George Street. This was a major turning point for the school and began its transformation into one of Ottawa's flagship cultural institutions. Morton continued to teach watercolour at OSA and Algonquin College in the 1980's and 1990's. He also continued to paint and exhibit his work. He enjoyed teaching and continued to teach well into his 80's.

Morton Baslaw was a great artist and an extraordinary teacher.

He served the Ottawa School of Art very well and with great devotion over many years. He played a key role in the school's development as an institution and as a centre for visual arts training. He was always keenly aware of the needs of his students and tried to ensure that they had a positive learning experience. He will be greatly missed by his friends and colleagues at the school as well as in the arts community.

### Daisy Kurp

Daisy Kurp passed away with her family by her side, at St. Mary's Hospital, Kitchener, on Tuesday, October 4, 2016. .

Kurp, who at the age of 92 was still an active member of the Guelph Creative Arts Association, was known for her work with the Guelph Artisans store in Old Quebec Street and for being a regular on the Guelph Studio Tour.

She was also actively involved with the arts association's Painting on the Green annual show and sale, which artist Margaret Peter recalls is how she became friends with Kurp back in the 1970s.

Peter, who had come to Guelph to study art at the university, remembers Kurp encouraging her to submit a piece to the show. "We've been friends since then," she said.

She describes Kurp as a mentor to other artists and one who was always working to grow and improve as an artist herself.

"She studied with some very well-known artists," including Canadian painter Jack Reid, said Peter, noting that Kurp wasn't averse to spending money and time to travel and take workshops that would improve her art.



Kurp worked largely in watercolour, but also explored beyond watercolours into other media, Peter said.

"It's wonderful for an artist to be always improving" and to be willing to share what she's learned with others, Peter said of Kurp. Though, she noted, Kurp never wanted to formally teach a workshop or a class.

A member of the arts association since the 1950s, Kurp served on various boards and committees. Her work was shown in several local galleries and in juried exhibitions.

"Daisy and I showed together for years on the Guelph Studio Tour," Peter recalled.

Eventually, the work of readying her studio for the tour became too much, and Kurp began exhibiting with a group of artists at the Dublin Street church. For the past couple of years, an injury prevented her from taking part in the tour, said Peter.

But she never stopped painting.

"She was a fabulous artist – at 92," said Peter.

In the 1990s, Kurp was elected to the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolors, an organization founded by the likes of A.J. Casson and Franklin Carmichael to encourage excellence in the medium of watercolour.

"It's a pretty prestigious thing to be able to write those letters after your name," said Peter.

She believes that Kurp will live on in her work. Those who are lucky enough to own one of Kurp's paintings will likely think of her a little each time they look at it, "especially if they've met her," Peter said.

Kurp, who was still living independently, suffered a heart attack in her home. She ended up in St. Mary's Hospital in Kitchener, where she died Oct. 4 with family by her side.

She leaves behind a son, Kevin Kurp, daughter-in-law Lisa and granddaughter Amanda.
