My Creativity was waiting to re-emerge...

Looking back, my interest in painting and drawing was that of an avocation. A lack of confidence in my abilities was a barrier to taking it to that artistic level I saw in my grandmother's vocation. From my twenties on life became busier and more complex. It was a plausible excuse for letting the desire for this form of creating slip away.

My life instantly changed at age 59. Seven years ago a car accident caused me to suffer a catastrophic Brain Injury. This life challenge has slowed me down but I am learning how not to allow it to become a permanent obstacle, to my growth and productivity, as I walk down this uncharted road.

Coming to terms with my brain injury has allowed me to again find that creative "ME". Marlene Madole, has been instrumental in her support of me through this creative journey. Lam richer for fin

me through this creative journey. I am richer for finding my way back to the arts and a newly discovered passion for painting with watercolours. Each painting I work on energizes me, giving me a personal sense of "fulfilment" and "accomplishment".

I am less critical of how my paintings turn out than I was in my youth. They are truly works in progress just as I am. Even though Marlene finds she often has to repeat examples of techniques we learned in previous classes, it is part of the process and we are both okay with that. As I continue to move forward in my recovery from brain injury, I have been able to find a new enjoyment by coming back to those creative endeavours I once engaged in.



I am not so hard on myself when working on a painting. There is no one I need to please or impress. Constructive criticism is welcomed. I can accept if a piece feels finished or if it is better that I step away and begin something new. I am able to spend a concentrated hour of putting my focus into working on a watercolour. And YES it exhausts me, but it is a positive "cognitive" form of exhaustion.

As I enjoy this artistic exploration, it is Marlene who has had a positive impact on my sense of a creative "Me". I feel pride as I welcome this new chapter into my life.

What We Collect

President Jean Pederson and I were talking recently and she mentioned a watercolour book... about how outraged the writer was about brush choices, and how funny the language but how correct the sentiment. What a surprise! I have the same book, published in 1926 in England. I got it and read her the section about brushes that she remembered. ...

Excerpt from Chapter I. The Problem

"BRUSHES. Fine pictures can be painted with ill-prepared colours, but inferior brushes would severely handicap a technical genius. If a brush is not really good it is just bad and merits no consideration. Whatever the circumstances, there can be no economy in this direction. Only the best will do. The market is crowded with rubbish, made of hair which defies the best workmanship. A hundred of such is not worth one good brush.

A brush should be springy without being stiff, come to a point (that is if it is made so as to come to a point) without hesitation, and last long enough to make it far cheaper than any substitute. For ordinary use there is nothing to beat the finest red sable; for additional purposes, "washing out" for instance, brushes with stiffer hair are essential. The choice of shape is a matter of personal preference, but in the matter of size there is only one safe rule: never use a small brush if it is possible by practice to make a larger one do equally well, because there are so many occasions when speed is all-important. As individual brushes of the most expensive grade vary in quality, each should be tested before buying."

Where We Were in 1926... CSPWC in History

1st Members Exhibition Catalogue, **Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour** The Art Gallery of Toronto, Grange Park, April 1926 (there after the CSPWC 'Annual' Exhibition)

"In this exhibition the newly formed Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour comes before the public for the first time. Water Colour has been gaining in favour during recent years, especially as a sketching medium, amongst some of our younger men, the outcome being a desire on their part to form a Society for the purpose of presenting water colours only.

In the Fall of 1925 they took the matter up with some of the artists who have specialized in water colours, and at a fully attended meeting in November the new Society was organized.

Invitations had previously been sent to well known workers in this medium in other parts of Canada, and the hearty response in every case fully justified the adoption of a national title for the Society.

It is hoped that the Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour will become a permanent factor in the art life of Canada and that it will succeed in encouraging a more general use of this delightful medium."





Neville Clarke commissioned portrait of Austin Clarke

February 23 was the official 'virutal' unveiling at the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto, of a newly commissioned portrait, which honours the legacy of renowned Black Canadian author and civil rights activist **Austin Clarke**, in *Austin Clarke: Recognizing A Literary Great*. The portrait, created by **CSPWC artist Neville Clarke**, Whitby, ON (no relation), will be a welcome addition to the gallery which was sponsored by JWL Forster National Portrait Gallery Fund. This work of art will be on display in the Sigmund Samuel Gallery of Canada and the ROM invites you to reflect on a leader whose quiet power could persuade and inspire.

Austin Ardinel Chesterfield Clarke (b.1934 – d.2016), immigrated to Canada from Barbados in 1955. He is known for his literary works, many of which examine the residual effects of colonialism and slavery on contemporary race relations, as well as the themes of resilience and hope. Clarke's influential work conveys the significance and impact of Black Canadians in the cultural life of the country.



Anthony Jack Batten

It is with profound sadness that we share the news of the sudden passing of our Beloved Anthony Jack Batten on December 26, 2020. Tony. Cherished son of the late Jack and Eileen Batten, adored brother of Geoffrey and Sandra Batten and their Children Justin (Heidi). Samantha (Matt), David (Carmen), Victoria (Kyle), many great-nieces and greatnephews, the Jones family, extended family and friends around the world, the "Pords" and his revered lifetime friend Robert Rash.

Tony was born on November 6, 1940 in Eynsham Hall, Oxfordshire England. Receiving his early schooling in the UK, he moved to Canada in the 1950's.

After receiving a scholarship to attend Christ's hospital in Horsham UK, he attended classes at L'Ecole des Beaux

Arts and the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, eventually moving to Toronto in 1968 where he pursued his career as a visual artist. He perfected his craft by sketching and painting historic buildings, streetscapes and architectural renderings, inspired by extensive global travel. Acclaimed and recognized, his talent was rewarded with several prestigious awards including the A.J. Casson award in 1996, the CSPWC Julius Griffith Award in 1996, the Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee medal in 2002, to name a few. His extensive projects, works, exhibitions and activities can be referenced on his Wikipedia page and on his website at www.anthonyjbatten.

Tony was a well-loved member of the CSPWC (Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour) and its President (1993-1995) securing his place as a Lifetime member (2007). An active member of the OSA (Ontario Society of Canadian Artists), the SCA (Society of Canadian Artists) and the SFCA (Federation of Canadian Artists) as well as a devoted volunteer for the National Ballet of Canada.



Tony's love of visual arts, history, set design and architecture were shared serving as a renowned educator and respected staff member at Sir Oliver Mowat and Stephen Leacock in Scarborough, Ontario. A beloved teacher having retired in 1998, contacts were maintained with colleagues and students till the time of his passing. Unforgettable summers were spent teaching at the Canadian School at Cambridge (UK) University.

In recent years, Tony spent extensive time as a passionate member of Toronto's Arts & Letters Club. An iconic venue for socializing, exhibitions, lectures and quality time with valued friends and colleagues. A brilliant raconteur, his absence will be sorely missed.

A private cremation service will be held at Mount Pleasant Cemetery Toronto.

Sally Jarvis Sloan 1933-2021

Sally Jarvis Sloan passed away unexpectedly at home on January 26, 2021. She grew up in the west end of Toronto, attending Humberview Public School, Runnymede Collegiate, and earning her degree in Art and Archeology at the University of Toronto. She taught high school for the Peel Board for over thirty years.

She was a watercolour artist in her own right and while travelling in BC., France, Bermuda, and the Boston area, she painted all the way. As a member of the CSPWC for many years, she supported our organization by presenting both the Sloan Awards and the Jarvis Awards to recognized participants in Open Water. She later became an Honorary Member of the society. A tribute to her determination and love of art, she taught herself to paint once again after recovering from a serious operation in the early 1970s. She also was able to resume her teaching career. A remarkable lady!

Sally touched my life as a mentor early in my teaching career and with her, friendships blossomed among friends whose lives centered around the visual arts. In the year 2000, Sally phoned me from her clunky cell phone in the upper reaches of the Arts and Letters Club to tell me that I had become an elected member! She lived a more quiet and reserved life in recent years but managed to attend many AGM meetings and exhibitions.
