were the most time consuming from my perspective. The hours that Marlene, myself, Pop-


py and Mark gave to the Society in this regard, were countless. The time provided by the Membership committee Elizabeth and Missy were also commendable.

markable 60+ year career in watercolour. It was an honour to have a newly elected Life Member present.


Lastly, the Painting Exchange headed up by Peter Marsh. While there were only a handful of Members participating, those that did participate went





Voting for a New Member - when we started it...

"... I think I suggested (that) for a new member it had to be a hundred per cent vote to get them in. In other words, I didn't want politics. But there were two or three things happened that spoiled that and they had to go back to 51% or something. It worked for a little while but, I know that one year there, was a chap coming up for membership and he was very good and there was another member who just personally didn't like him. He voted against him ...one who voted against him. Well, he didn't get in that year. He did the next year. That's when we had to change away from that. ... "

CSPWC Honourary Member Passes

Ann MacIntosh Duff (1925-2022) RCA CSPWC OSA



recipient of the Queen's Jubilee Medal died peacefully at her home in Toronto at the age of 97. Ann was an active CSPWC elected member from 1952 for 30 years. Not wanting to lose

her, the society made her an Honourary Member, sometime after 1985.



At the McMichael Canadian Art Collection, opening on July 1*, there is a solo exhibition titled Ann MacIntosh Duff of her watercolours. This survey exhibit was selected from the 200 paintings gifted to the McMichael in 2022. On Sat. July 8th there is a curatorial talk about Ann McIntosh Duff's exhibition. Registration is required, free with gallery admission. The exhibition closes on March 3, 2024.

At the Tom Thomson Gallery in Owen Sound, ON, in 2007 held a 70-year Retrospective To Love and To Cherish, accompanied with a catalogue. Her works is in the collections of the National Gallery of Canada, the Art Gallery of Ontario (AGO), and the Tom Thomson Gallery.

Known primarily for her watercolours, she painted from memory, landscapes of the mind, as she called them. She worked from her boathouse studio on an island in Georgian Bay, Pointe au Baril, ON. This was a favourite subject. She also had a home studio in Toronto.

Ann was a student at Central Technical School from 1944-1946, where she had Doris McCarthy as an instructor (CSPWC President 1956-1958). At this time Peter Haworth was the head of "Central Tech" (CSPWC President 1934-1938). In the summers between those school years, she studied with André Biéler (CSPWC Member) and Caven Atkins (CSPWC President 1943-1945) at Queen's University in Kingston, ON.



Ann exhibited in the CSPWC Annual Exhibitions (now known as *Open Water*) from 1948-1989. In 1975 she exhibited at the AGO – **Fifty Years** The Canadian Society of Painters In Water Colour 1925-1975. Also, Ann had a painting in the Japan-Canada Water Colour Exchange Show, touring Canada and Japan in 1976. In 1985 Ann's painting Garages in Winter was in the first phase of the CSPWC Royal Collection Project RCIN 926171. She also exhibited in International Waters, the CSPWC collaboration with the national watercolour societies, which toured Canada, United States, England, and Scotland from 1991-1993.

Pauline was instrumental in bringing many well known international artists to Ontario for teaching workshops. She was a member of the Willowdale Group of Artists, the Toronto Watercolour Society, the Central Ontario Art Association, the Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour, and the Vodka Painters of Canada. She taught at the Haliburton School of Fine Arts for many years and her paintings hang in many international and Canadian collections. Pauline had a great love of Canada and the natural world, painting and teaching outdoors whenever possible.

Linda also writes of Pauline: that she was always a lot of fun and a very active member of the Central Ontario Art Association. Pauline hosted workshops in her studio or near her home with international artists. Her home was filled, floor to ceiling with

the artwork of other artists. Pauline loved water-colour with a lifelong passion. Pauline and Jake were both voted into membership in the same year and that was a big celebration.

Barbara Foska writes that Pauline was a wonderful person. She was always so friendly and approachable, and willing to be helpful and get involved in everything. She used to make the Central Ontario fall 'Geneva' weekend so much fun. She would arrange for entertainment and for everything to just go so smoothly. We had a ball there every year. Both Pauline and Jake really made that weekend so special every year. No one will forget her wonderful warm personality. She will definitely be missed.

Watercolour Extravaganza in Bologna Italy; April 2023



Back in the fall of 2022, when I first received the invitation from Michael Solovyev, the

leader of the Canadian delegation, to consider entering the exhibition at the Fabriano in Acquarello watercolour event in Bologna, Italy, I was intrigued. This looked like an exciting event that gathered watercolour artists from all over the world, and it looked like a unique opportunity to participate in an international exhibition.

The initial steps involved submitting a watercolour painting for selection as part of the Canadian delegation to Bologna. When I learned that my painting was accepted, my wife, Kathy, and I began considering traveling to Italy to participate in the festival events. We're always looking for a good excuse to plan an adventure.

What is Fabriano in Acquarello?

At first, it was somewhat tricky to figure out what this Fabriano in Acquarello was. This artistic movement began in the Municipality of Fabriano, Italy, in 2010 with the goal of bringing together artists, organizations, companies, schools, and people with an interest in watercolour around the world. This organization sets up congress meetings, exhibitions, cultural events, product displays and all sorts of activities to do with achievement in watercolour. It's a very ambitious program that is intended to be very inclusive rather than competitive. Their program seems to have meetings and events in diverse cities at various times throughout the year. It's a very complex organization.

My participation was focused on the events and exhibition presented in the city of Bologna, Italy, from April 23 to 25, 2023. Kathy and I flew to Rome, spent a couple of days there and then went

by train to Bologna. The festival kicked off with a reception at the historic Palazzo Isolani attended by over 400 artists visiting from around the world. We managed to get lost on the way back to the hotel and saw much more of Bologna than we intended. Fortunately, it is a very friendly place!

The following day, I attended a portrait painting workshop presented by our Canadian leader, Mi-



chael Solovyev. Despite some rather daunting circumstances, he presented an amazing demonstration and workshop that was very valuable. We all came expecting the usual workshop set-up with tables, chairs, water and model, but found ourselves crammed into an ancient library room filled with chairs and no sign of a model. Michael, the ultimate professional, calmly assessed the disappointing physical arrangements and proceeded to teach us an impressive sequence of useful techniques and principles that made the experience very worthwhile.

We had to pre-arrange and pre-pay for the work-

shops, but there was a steady program of free master demos presented in one of the main halls. These were impressive artists from all over the world who shared their watercolour insights and skills.

In addition, there were dozens of displays of tempting watercolour paints, tools, brushes, papers and other paraphernalia that I had never heard of before. Sadly, I did not bring a giant suitcase.



One of the unique activities was a large roll of watercolour paper on the ground in the central plaza where volunteer artists painted on their knees in front of massive crowds.

The Exhibition

As I came to understand that the exhibition of watercolour paintings would feature the works by



about 1300 artists from 80 countries around the world, I was very curious to see how such a huge collection could be displayed. The show was set up in a large auditorium, the Sala Borsa on the main city plaza. All the artists were limited to half sheet

or quarter sheet sizes (the majority being half sheet paintings) which were inserted without mats or



frames into rigid transparent sleeves that were displayed on rows of racks throughout the hall. The works were arranged by country, and I think our Canadian contribution (which included several CSPWC members) was impressive. Even though the show was only on display for three days, there were thousands of people packed into the streets and plaza just outside the exhibition hall. I'm certain that this show had more visitors in three days than most month-long shows ever get. The show will then go to Fabriano, Italy, where it will be on display during July and August.

Here are words from one of the exhibition posters. "Art is a human heritage, a right of every human being. This exhibition features the other perspective of Fabriano in Acquarello, no longer a conference meeting, but an Art Operation: The voice and the tool of peace."

Additional Features

Each participating artist will have free access to the digital catalogue that will be available. There is also a paper catalogue that can be ordered.

Another part of the program that I did not take advantage of was the selection of painting holidays to Bologna, Venice, Verona, Florence, Fabriano and other sites.

Costs

Fortunately, the costs to participate in the show

were not expensive, just a fee of \$102 to cover the shipping of the artwork to Italy and back. The workshops, reception and painting holidays did have reasonable fees. Participants were responsible for their own travel costs and arrangements.

After the Fabriano in Acquarello events, we traveled to Florence for a few days of exploring the renaissance treasures there...and enjoy a few gelatos. It was all a glorious experience.



Last year's event began just like the last few Calls from Mexico, that is to say, the deadline for the Call of this Exhibition was nearly missed again. When it was realized to be an oversight, on a weekend when the office is closed, I began to reach out and locate Member artists willing and able to submit work.



catalytic achievement changed the face of Canadian painting forever. This exhibition, the first major Thomson retrospective in 20 years, will offer a close look at Thomson's legacy, focusing on the small en plein air oil paintings, also know as oil sketches, of which he is the supreme master. This exhibition is organized by the McMichael with the exceptional support of the National Gallery of Canada. North Star is curated by Ian A.C. Dejardin and Sarah Milroy.

Southern Ontario has a New Regional Director... and her name is Anita Wood!

Well, it's true. First of all, let me explain... The CSPWC Board has voted in a name change to the Prairies Region, and regional name change and scope to three of the four regions within Ontario (as per our by-laws see below).

The former Alberta & the Prairies, will now be known as the Prairies Region, so as not to single out only one of the three prairie provinces; Brent Laycock is the Prairies Regional Director.

In preparations of the slate for our recent AGM and as Chair of the Nominating Committee, I recruited three new regional director candidates to stand for their regional vote, all voted in by acclamation — Marney-Rose Edge of New Westminster, British Columbia is the BC & the North Regional Director, Linda Finn of Elliot Lake, Ontario is the Northern Ontario Regional Director and Gary McFarland of Blandford, Nova Scotia is the Atlantic Regional Director. The new regional directors will be featured in upcoming editions. Previous sitting

Regional Directors agreed to stay on the board as members at large – Alice Bottrill of Harrison Hot Springs, BC, and Ellen Catherwood of Timmins, Northern Ontario.

I also corresponded with the vacant regions of Central and Eastern Ontario, including with former regional directors. As I could not locate any candidates, and the vacancies were over four years or more, I made a motion that we amalgamate the three regions — Western Ontario, Central Ontario and Eastern Ontario — into a new region renamed "Southern Ontario". Anita Wood, as the standing Western Ontario Regional Director, has accepted this new position.

In my research, I came to understand that the CSPWC had two "Western" Regional Directors, although one was from B.C. and one from Alberta. Atlantic Canada region started when one individual artist was voted into membership; originally she went to school in Toronto. The former Central Ontario existed six years, with one regional director at its helm.
